

The American Religious Landscape in 2014






Religious Affiliation in the US, 1974-2050






Racial Composition of Protestants, 1974-2014





Racial Composition of Catholics, 1974-2014






Widening Generation Gap Among Religiously Unaffiliated




Growth of the Religiously Unaffiliated, 1974-2014



Generational Divides: White Evangelical Protestants vs. Unaffiliated




Percent who identify as white evangelical Protestant vs. unaffiliated by age (Moving Averages)



Religious Affiliation Among Millennials by Race/Ethnicity






Would you say the following groups are changing American culture and way of life for the better, changing it for the worse, or are they not having any real impact on American culture and way of life?













How important do you think being a Christian is for being truly American?





Trend: Perception of American as a Christian Nation








By generation

- Don't know/Refused (VOL)




Perceptions of Changes to American Culture Since 1950s
